Archiving Historic Product Data and Details Industry Roundtable: Friday, November 18, 2016

Technical documents describing specific building materials and assemblies are an essential part of a practicing architect's library. Commercial trade catalogs make up the core these professional libraries, and contemporary preservation architects frequently refer to period trade catalogs to augment contemporary publications. Period trade catalogs can be highly valuable to preservation professionals in assessing structures for their historical evolution, environmental safety, or any other architectural or engineering conditions. Trade catalogs, because of their relatively short lifespan and commercial nature are not found in most architectural libraries.

The Association for Preservation Technology (APT) recognized the value of period trade catalogs and other technical publications and saw the need for a comprehensive digital archive to serve a broad audience of preservation and architectural students, professionals and advocates. This roundtable will discuss what is currently being done and the importance of maintaining this historical data.

- Learn the importance of preserving historic data and information on building materials, and the value of an exhaustive and accurate archive of building material information.


